Instructions

Five Dice · Score Card · Pencil
1–4 Players · About 15 Minutes

The Objective

Just like real golf, go round eighteen holes in the fewest strokes. Lowest total wins.

Playing A Hole

- Roll all five dice.
- Keep any you like and roll the rest again. You get three rolls in all - the first one, then two more. Keep and re-roll whatever you want each time, including dice you set aside earlier.
- Find your best hand from the list below.
- Write it on a hole. Look your hand up on the back, read across to the par of the hole you want, and write that number on your card. Each hole can only be used once. Fill all nine on the front before you start the back, just like playing a course. Eighteen turns and your card is full.

Where You Write It Is The Game

The same hand is worth a different number of strokes depending on the hole you spend it on. Two things follow:

- Big hands are worth more on the long holes.
- A wrecked turn hurts least on a par 3, and there are only four of them.

The Hands (Best to Worst)

Five of a Kind	all five dice the same
Four of a Kind	four the same
Large Straight	five in a row
Full House	three of one and two of another
Small Straight	four in a row
Three of a Kind	three the same
Two Pair	two different pairs
One Pair	two the same
Nothing	none of the above

Finishing

- Add the front nine for your OUT score and the back nine for your IN score. Together they make your TOTAL. Lowest wins — the card plays to a par of 72.

Playing With Other People

- Everyone keeps their own card and takes it in turns to roll. Lowest total wins.
- Skins. Play each hole starting at the first for a point instead of totalling. Lowest score on a hole takes it — but if two players tie, nobody wins it and the point carries to the next hole, so a late hole can be worth four or five at once.
- Nine holes. Short of time? Play the front nine and compare OUT scores.
